NATIONAL EXHIBITION JUROR OF AWARDS STATEMENT ROSE FRANTZEN

I would like to begin by thanking all of you for including me in the 29th Annual National Juried Exhibition. I truly enjoyed working with all of you and having a chance to see what traditional oil painters from all over the country are creating.

Perhaps it is proper to start with the idea of what constitutes tradition in oil painting. As a jurist, I am less apt to think that this means subject matter and more likely means qualities inherent to oil painting. This, in a technical sense, especially for me, means paint quality, how the paint is applied, utilizing oil paints capacity to be both thick and thin, handled by scumbling, glazing, bravura, muted and/or saturated, layered, in washes, with precise, and loose edges. Oil paint is magical in its



depth and breadth of utility. Mastering this medium takes time, and I think, as we look closely, we can all agree that there are qualities that we can "just see" in works that represent understanding of how to use oil paint.

It is with this understanding that I move to the trickier part of jurying a show. This would be what I feel is the more subjective part. Subjectivity is our natural intellectual state, and we all must concede that any competition with a human jurist will reflect that jurist's taste and possibly, in my case, ambitions for oil painting in this 21^{st} century America. I don't know if those of you reading these words were able to hear my remarks about the paintings during the Zoom convention... if not, a brief synopsis: I applauded and rewarded invention in subject matter, attempts at narrative, shifts in perspective, exquisite execution, interpretation of subject, design, attempts at a complete thought, and finally undeniable beauty, as in the case of the winner's painting. I chose to honor Bryce Liston OPA and all award winners and finalists with my most sincere attention and appreciation and love for the gift of expressing ourselves in oil paint.


MEET THE MASTER SIGNATURE DIVISION GOLD MEDAL WINNER JEFFREY WATTS OPAM

Jeffrey R. Watts is a southern California native. Growing up in rural San Diego county with an artist father, Watts demonstrated an early aptitude for the visual arts. But it was competitive sports that held his interest as a teenager. After an injury cut short his budding career in professional cycling, Jeff turned his focus back to art, enrolling at the California Art Institute in Calabasas. Watts was soon asked to teach at the institute and began to work

as an illustrator in the movie industry. However, Jeff's goal to become an easel painter would draw him back to San Diego where he started a small life drawing and painting studio known as Watts Atelier of the Arts. Jeff's aesthetic sensibilities have long drawn him to the figurative art of nineteenth century Europe and Russia. His Atelier allows him to work regularly from the live model, grounding his work in traditional principles. Recently, Jeff's work has been compared to that of Nicolai Fechin, an influence he is quick to acknowledge. "I never tire of looking at the work of Nicolai Fechin" Watts says, "his work is the perfect combination of control and chaos." In 2008 The Taos Art Museum and Fechin House honored Watts with a Solo Exhibition in the original Taos home and studio of Fechin.

Jeff's oil paintings have won numerous awards including First Place Portrait category and Second Place Landscape category from the *Artist's Magazine*, two consecutive Second Place Awards at the Salon International Exhibition, an Honor Award and an Award of Exceptional Merit from the Portrait Society of America, 3 Awards of Excellence from Oil Painters of America and 3 Top 100 Awards from Arts for the Parks among others. Watts is a regular participant in the prestigious Prix de West Invitational held at the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City.

Watts's work has been featured in numerous magazines. He is a Master Signature member of Oil Painters of America, a Signature Member of both the Laguna Plein Air Painters Association and the California Art Club, and holds membership in the Portrait Society of America.



MEET THE ASSOCIATE AND SIGNATURE DIVISION GOLD MEDAL WINNER BRYCE C. LISTON OPA

Born in 1965 in a small town in Utah, Bryce believes his first desire to be an artist was formed at a very young age when he would go out with his mother while she painted the Utah landscape. Later in school, drawing was a comfort zone for Liston. "It was a subject that excited me- I always had energy and interest for it." It was here that Liston found his love of the human form. "I don't quite know why I was drawn to the human form; I suspect the seed was planted while studying the art of the great American Illustrators like N.C. Wyeth and Howard Pyle."



It was then that he knew it was the human form that he wanted to portray in his art. He attended the University of Utah for a short time but dropped out before finishing his degree. "I wanted to learn about the craft of art. I wanted to learn to actually *produce* art, not just discuss it." With limited resources Bryce found himself working in the studio and foundry of master sculptor, Edward J. Fraughton. The time Liston spent with Fraughton provided him with a knowledge of anatomy that few painters possess and that understanding brings depth and life to the figures he paints. "In Ed's studio I learned a lot about art. It's funny, I learned about painting from a sculptor- I don't think that's something that happens everyday."

Bryce's education has been self-directed and continues to be that way. Not having a formal art education can be a long and hard way to go about it but it does have its advantages. It allows you to find your own voice rather than emulating that of your teachers, a principle lesson that Liston imparts to all of his students. "Take in all the information that is presented to you, then afterwards disassemble it and make it fit into your personal vision and style."

Bryce's work is shown in galleries around the country and he participates in many national and international exhibitions each year. Bryce's artwork has won numerous prestigious awards, and his art has been published in many magazines as well as on book covers. He currently resides in Holladay, Utah with his wife and three daughters. "I can't even imagine myself not painting or sculpting. My mother was a very talented artist and I can already see some of the same abilities emerging in my young daughters.

OPA INTRODUCED ITS FIRST VIRTUAL INTERNATIONAL WET PAINT COMPETITION & CONVENTION IN 2020

OPA introduced its first International Wet Paint Competition & Convention in September and received rave reviews from the participants. Not being able to hold our annual Wet Paint Event at the National Convention warranted some concerted thinking on the part of OPA Executive Director Kathryn Beligratis and OPA Board members. The subsequent Virtual Wet Paint Competition was such a success that it will now be held annually.

OPA members, as well as nonmembers, were invited to participate in two days of plein air and studio painting and then submit their efforts into competition if they so desired. Awards were given in three categories: plein air for OPA members, studio for OPA members and open division for non-OPA members and international participants, with monetary and merchandise awards equaling about \$20,000.

Those wishing to view participants painting during these 2 days were able to do so via Zoom. Artists freely offered advice and insights as they painted and it was definitely a

learning experience. A few of the suggestions: member Carol Arnold explained that using a mirror to look at your painting and your model at the same time is a great way to see if any error in your painting might exist. Vicki Norman talked about how to keep paints from going dull and Poppi Balser lives by the creed that "the more you paint, the more it comes". Thank you to the many artists who checked in while painting and shared their experiences.

Wet Paint Award of Excellence: Lyn Boyer OPA for *The Bird Watcher* funded by OPA

INTERNATIONAL WET PAINT COMPETITION JUROR OF AWARDS STATEMENT JOHN POTOTSCHNIK OPA

Asked to judge OPA's First International Wet Paint Competition was an honor and a responsibility I did not take lightly. Sadly, I was not able to view the submitted works directly but only online, due to...well, you know...

The flexibility of the OPA Board in figuring out a way for the competition to go forward was quite remarkable; in fact, for the first time it became international. The challenge was divided into three divisions: Plein Air, Studio, and Open; the Open Category was just that...open to all non-OPA members worldwide. All submitted works were required to be completed directly from life whether in plein air or in the studio.



There were over 200 entries. I reviewed all the images several times, getting to the point of almost having them memorized. Care was taken not to look at names; I did not want to be influenced by a name but only by the quality of the art. Thirty artists were given awards. The top award getters were easy to select. Those works close in quality required extra scrutiny.

My emotional reaction to a piece was the first thing noted. After that, the question was asked, "Why?" That's when judging becomes very difficult. The answers to "why" were found in 1) Clarity of concept, 2) Composition, 3) Drawing, 4) Values, 5) Color, and 6) Technique. I believe all the award winners successfully answered the question. My only regret...not being able to present the awards personally to these fine artists.

MEET THE STUDIO DIVISION WINNER OF THE INTERNATIONAL WET PAINT COMPETITION MARYBETH KARAUS OPA

MaryBeth Karaus is a graduate of the DAAP program of the University of Cincinnati, but her artistic training began years before any formal study. Her mother was a passionate artist, and she was raised with an intrinsic appreciation and understanding of art. For the last 25 years she has been a dedicated mom of four while pursuing painting, and in recent years focusing on still-life. Pushing the boundaries of traditional still life, she strives for originality and excellence in composition while still respecting the importance of classical painting.



Karaus first began her career as an artist in watercolors, a form she was drawn to from the teaching of Robert James Foose of the University of Kentucky. As a watercolor artist she was juried into numerous watercolor shows. She also became a Signature member of the Cincinnati Art Club.

After concentrating for some time in the medium of watercolor, she began studying oil painting, beginning with a workshop with respected artist Dan Gerhartz OPAM in 2004. In 2006, she won the Top Award of Excellence from the juried exhibition of the Woman's Art Club of Cincinnati. In 2012 she took an intensive study of classical drawing and painting with artist David Mueller OPAM. In the last ten years, her work was accepted into the OPA National Juried Exhibition seven times, and she was awarded status of Signature Member of OPA in 2015. The year 2017 also included the Impressionist Honorable Mention at the National Show. She was very honored to be asked to be a demo artist for the 2017 National Convention.

MaryBeth has consistently been receiving awards at OPA exhibitions and was a Finalist in the Art Renewal Center's International ARC Salon Competitions in 2017, 2018 and 2020.

Karaus is an active member of the Cincinnati Art Club, the second oldest continually operating art club in the country. She has taught several workshops locally. She currently displays her work at Eisele Gallery of Fine Art in Cincinnati, Ohio, Reinert Fine Art in Charleston, South Carolina, and Wally Workman Gallery in Austin, Texas.



MEET THE OPEN DIVISION WINNER OF THE INTERNATIONAL WET PAINT COMPETITION HAIDEE-JO SUMMERS

Haidee-Jo is a full-time professional artist known for painting landscapes and seascapes. An elected member of the Royal Institute of Oil painters (ROI) and the Royal Society of Marine Artists (RSMA) her work can be seen each year at the Mall Galleries in London in these prestigious society exhibitions. Haidee-Jo writes regularly for *The Artist* magazine and is proud to be one of their three editorial consultants, alongside Ken Howard RA and David Curtis ROI RSMA. Her first book on oil painting, *Vibrant Oils*, has been reprinted in Spanish, Italian, French and Chinese. She has produced a popular DVD with

APV films and a second will be available soon. Although oils are very much her preferred medium, in the 1990's Haidee-Jo produced a large body of work for the Encyclopaedia of Watercolour Techniques and is an avid sketcher. In recent years she has been invited to judge UK and international plein air events, after winning many prizes for her work which features fresh and vibrant brushwork coupled with keen drawing and observational skills.

Haidee-Jo gained a degree in illustration following an art foundation course and graduated in 1994. She has been exhibiting and teaching ever since, in recent years having cut back on teaching commitments to focus on painting and writing. She believes very much in continuing to grow and develop, all the while striving to express her personal voice in paint and to do so more and more succinctly.

"My work is a celebration of light filled moments revealed in rich and vibrant oil paint using my personal visual language of fresh and direct brush marks. Painting en plein air is central to my practice but I am equally at home working from a model, still life or interior. I find beauty in the ordinary, mundane and intimate rather than the grand vista. Coastal locations, domestic interiors and gardens and allotments provide me with rich and endless subject material. My approach is one of simplicity and economy, striving to make every mark count in my earnest pursuance of capturing the poetry of a fleeting effect of light."





DANIEL GREENE OPAM A GREAT LOSS TO THE ART WORLD

Of the many great people who passed during the year of 2020 we make special note of past OPA Master Signature Member Daniel E. Greene. Born in Cincinnati, OH on February 26, 1934 he was world renowned for his oils and pastels and taught over 10,000 students during his lifetime. He was a member of OPA since it's inception in 1991 and participated in OPA exhibitions throughout his career, until his passing on April 5, 2020 in North Salem, NY.

Greene was a strong proponent of the Artists' Fellowship, an organization that provides financial assistance to professional visual artists and their families in times of emergency, disability or bereavement. Greene will be sadly missed by family, friends and the art world.

We are pleased to introduce the most recent conferees of this most prestigious designation which is in recognition of their exceptional talent and dedication to representational oil painting. Welcome to Johanna Harmon, David Mueller, Mary Qian, Camille Przewodek and Deborah Tilby.

JOHANNA HARMON OPAM

Johanna Harmon was born in 1968 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, but spent most of her childhood in Tempe, Arizona. Johanna began designing and recording visual observations at the age of seven, but it wasn't until almost two decades later that she was introduced to the traditional language of art at the Scottsdale Artists' School in Arizona, the Fechin Art Institute in Taos, New Mexico, and the Art Students League of Denver in Colorado. There, she studied painting alongside prominent portrait and figure artists with varied artistic philosophies and approaches such as Carolyn Anderson, John Asaro, Mark Daily, Daniel Gerhartz OPAM, Quang Ho OPAM and C.W. Mundy OPAM. Following her 2013 OPA National Gold Medal award, she expanded her understanding further by studying contemporary realism with Daniel Sprick, and abstract realism with David A. Leffel OPAM and Sherrie McGraw OPAM.

Her work has been presented in numerous solo, group and juried exhibitions including the Portrait Society of America (PSoA), Oil Painters of America (OPA), Art Renewal Center, California Art Club, and Scottsdale Artists' School, where she received numerous prestigious awards.

Her work has been published in American Art Collector, International Artist, Fine Art Connoisseur, Southwest Art, Artbook of the New West, and Focus Santa Fe and is collected internationally.

Harmon was honored to be on the faculty of PSoA's 2019 Art of the Portrait Conference and OPA's 2017 National Convention, Curator and Juror for two North River Arts Society's Focus On Figures exhibitions, and Juror Of Awards for Oil Painters of America's 2015 Western Regional Juried Exhibition.

She has taught workshops at Scottsdale Artists' School in Arizona, North River Arts Society in Marshfield Hills, Massachusetts, The Coppini Academy of Art in San Antonio, Texas, and The Art Student's League of Denver in Colorado. Her emphasis is on the clarification of visual intention, while nurturing the overall painted subject. This pivotal understanding defines her work today. She credits Cecilia Beaux, Nicolai Fechin, John Singer Sargent, Joaquin Sorolla, Abbott Handerson Thayer and Anders Zorn as inspiration.

Johanna now resides in beautiful Colorado, with her husband of 23 years, Steven.

DAVID MUELLER OPAM

In 2016, I was having breakfast before a radiation treatment for cancer. I received an email notification that I had been accepted into my first OPA juried exhibition in about 12 years. Life takes us in different directions at times and I had somehow fallen away from the fold and not submitted my work over that time. But the timing could not have been better for this particular artist at that particular time. I know that it was a tearful moment. The ray of hope that it provided and something to which I could look forward to in an area of so much passion in my life, was so very meaningful to me.



I remember clearly, having travelled to Dallas for that year's National. Among other wonderful experiences from that trip, I recall sitting at a table at a rooftop bar toasting life and the view overlooking downtown with a glass of prosecco. I remember what a great blessing it was yet again, ART..... art community..... and an organization like OPA.

The organization and it's wonderful structure of incentivizing artists to produce their best possible works and participate in the community of shared support and knowledge helped provide further goals to me in the gift of my new life after being blessed with the label of "survivor".

Since that time I have been so very fortunate in both my health and my acceptance into these wonderful juried exhibitions and the conferences that allow us to meet others that speak with the same language, support and encourage one another and learn so much along the way. I am honored, blessed and humbled having received this recognition of Master Signature status in Oil Painters of America and I look forward to many more years of being truly inspired and motivated by rubbing elbows with some of the very finest artists living today.

What I have learned over the years and first realized from my father and his art life, is that the greatest gift of being an artist is the people with whom we connect throughout our careers. I have sat with Governors in their homes discussing their portraits, stood in the White House in front of the Official Christmas tree with my art on an ornament on the tree, lived far above my artist's means because of the sharing of so many others who in return only ask me to share beauty with them.

Especially, in this particular time, how much we look forward to attending once again, each others exhibitions and lectures, being a juror or juried or slinging some high chroma hues side by side. Even virtually, my fellow artists are an ever present gift throughout it all.




MARY QIAN OPAM

Mary Qian was born in Shanghai, China where her mother was a physicist and her father was a chemist. However, by the time she was 19 she decided that she did not want to follow in her parents' science-based footsteps but wanted to pursue a career in art. Fortunately, her parents fully supported her desire. Having no classical training in art she knew she would not be able to attend an art college in China so she looked elsewhere for artistic training. Her mother had friends who taught at Brigham Young University in Utah and that is where she applied and was accepted. While studying there she developed her love of western art.

Mary moved to Chicago in 2002 and worked for a video-gaming company creating games during the workday and visiting Chicago's famous Palette and Chisel on weekends. In 2008 she decided to exit the world of video-game creation and devote her life to being a full-time fine artist. She has since become known for landscapes and still lifes, but is mainly known for her tender and thought provoking portraits. She has been an OPA Gold Medal winner as well as a recipient of the Dorothy Driehaus Mellin Fellowship for Midwestern Artists.

To quote Mary "I feel my art is like an open diary. It records my life, and the life around me. My paintings are my preferred way to explain myself to the world. They speak of the things I don't know how to put into words. I hope viewers will feel what I felt in the moments of painting. See what inspired me!"



CAMILLE PRZEWODEK OPAM

Camille Przewodek's creativity is centered around her excitement over light —"Light as it falls on the landscape at specific times of day and under specific conditions." In addition to her training at Wayne State University in Detroit and the Academy of Art College in San Francisco, Camille studied color with impressionist master, Henry Hensche, at the Cape School of Art in Provincetown, MA. "My use of color is inspired by color relationships perceived under many varied light schemes. Light itself becomes the subject matter and carries the painting."

She has written several articles on capturing the light effects of nature for American Artist, International Artist, Southwest Art and The Artist's magazines. Her paintings have appeared on posters, wine labels and in national ad campaigns for clients Alfa Romeo, Loews Hotels, and others. Przewodek has received first place awards at the Napa Valley Museum, the American Impressionist Society's Annual Exhibition, and the Sausalito Art Festival. In 2011, she won Easton Plein Air Competition's Grand Prize. She has been a guest artist with the Plein Air Painters of America and is included in the book, Enchanted Isle, A History of Plein Air Painting in Santa Catalina Island. Camille is a Signature Member of the Laguna Plein Air Painters, and the California Art Club; a Master Signature Member of American Women Artists, American Impressionist Society, and now Oil Painters of America.

Przewodek teaches and paints throughout the country, and offers workshops close to home at her studio in Petaluma, as well as weekly online classes. In 2010, she was an invited instructor, lecturer, and panelist on the Hensche-Hawthorne approach to seeing and painting color at *A merican A rtist Magazine's* Weekend with the Masters. Camille is one of a handful of contemporary Hensche students teaching the Cape School approach to capturing light in painting, and has been a regularly featured instructor and on-stage demo artist at PleinAir Magazine's Annual Plein Air Convention.


GREG LaROCK OPA A FRIEND TO MANY

DEBORAH TILBY OPAM

Light and shadow is what initially draws me to a subject; the challenge of capturing the mood, time of day, and season in a representational yet loose way is what keeps me painting. My aim, whether it be in the studio or in the field, is to use colour as I see it, with a particular fondness for neutrals and earth colours, soft violets, rusts, and greens. The way the paint goes on is equally as important as what I mix on the palette; my intention is to indicate and represent, without becoming bogged down in the minutiae.

Weathered boats, rusty mailboxes, old brick and textured stone, crashing waves and trees in every season, all afford me the opportunity to explore my interpretation of textures with both brush and knife work.



Accomplishing what I intend never ceases to be difficult, fascinating, and deeply fulfilling. It keeps me painting almost daily!

Painting began for me with my first watercolour at age eighteen. I love watercolour and it held my interest for many years, before I began working with oils. I am Canadian but for fourteen years, England was home and European street scenes and landscapes were my subject. A move to the west coast of British Columbia turned my attention toward the beaches, boats, waves, and marinas of coastal living. Not entirely committed to trading Europe for Canada, I have travelled between the two, keeping my perspective fresh and allowing my work to straddle both continents. I now stick to oils most of the time, only occasionally reaching for my watercolours. I still love watercolour but am drawn to the flexibility, freedom, and richness that oils offer.

I became a painter by way of being an observer – I have always noticed light and shadow, shapes, texture, composition and colour, and endeavouring to interpret my observations through painting has been a lifelong passion. That people choose my work to hang in witness of their lives is a bonus, both wonderful and humbling.

Tilbey is currently represented by Gallery 8, Salt Spring Island, BC and Peninsula Gallery, Sidney, BC. She has been featured in many magazines, most recently *Fine Art Connoisseur* (Feb 2020) and *Circle Foundation for the Arts* (2020). And she has won many awards through 2020 such as the Alden Bryan Memorial Award, AAPL 92 Grand National (2020), Best in Show, Sedona/Gateway Competition (Sept 2020), Best in Show, Sedona/Gateway Competition (July 2020), Best Landscape, Plein Air Salon (June/July2020), First place, Impressionist Landscape AmerArt Awards (2020), 2nd-tie, Impressionist Landscape AmerArt Awards (2020) and First Place, FCA 365 Exhibition (2020).

Sadly, we announce the passing of OPA Board Member James W. Bruce Jr. OPA on December 25, 2020. Jim was a long time member of OPA, serving on the Board of Directors since 2010. He brought with him extensive knowledge in not only the art world but also in the financial world. He graduated from the University of Oklahoma and the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration. He spent most of his life in the banking industry with Liberty National Bank and as Chairman and CEO of American Bank Systems.



Jim's had a beautiful tenor voice that graced his Presbyterian Church's choir. And his devotion to music led him to become the President and Director of Canterbury Voices (established to transform lives and inspire communities through choral music).

His art lessons started in Oklahoma at the age of fourteen and were followed by lessons with famous artist Richard V. Goetz, who influenced him greatly. He also studied with artists such as Scott Christensen, David Leffel OPAM, and Sherrie McGraw OPAM.

He won many awards for his still lifes and landscapes and was a member of New York City's prestigious Salmagundi Club.

MEET OUR RECENTLY RETIRED BOARD MEMBERS ZHIWEI TU OPAM AND KONRAD HACK OPA

Zhiwei Tu OPAM is a well known face at OPA exhibitions and conventions as he has been on the Board of Directors since 2001 and served as President from 2005 - 2007.

Tu was born in Northern Guangdong Province in China and spent his childhood working on his family land and attending the local school. When he was in high school he painted a portrait of Mao Zedong, founding father of the People's Republic of China, that caught the attention of his village officials and helped start his artistic career.

Tu earned a B.A degree from Guangzhou Institute of Fine Arts and earned his MFA in 1981. During this time he taught art at the Teaching College of Shiao Guan and at Guangzhou Institute. After moving to the US Tu entered Drake University, Des Moines, Iowa, to study Art and English. He traveled throughout the US at that time and eventually moved to Chicago, to become associated with the Palette and Chisel Academy of Fine Arts.



Tu's artistic abilities are so highly regarded by the government of China that the Zhiwei Tu Art Museum housing his work opened its doors in October 2013 on the banks of the North River of Guangdong. The museum consists of over 400 of his drawings, gouaches and oils as well as an art research center.

Tu is best known for his expressive portraits and historical murals which are in collections throughout the world.

Konrad F. Hack OPA has been a member of OPA since it's inception and joined the Board of Directors in 2002. He served as the Shirl Smithson Memorial Scholarship Chairperson from 2004 through 2018.

Konrad was born in Chicago, Illinois and received his B.F. A. degree from the Art Institute of Chicago and the University of Chicago in 1968. In 1989 he received his M.A. degree with honors from Governors State University, in Illinois. From 1970 to 1973 he was a staff artist for W.G.N. TV in Chicago. And he was on the staff of Robert Morris College for a number of years.

Konrad is best known for his work related to military paintings. He served as a combat artist in Vietnam for the Department of Military History in 1968. He continued his career in military-related art and became a founding member of the Chicago, United States Air Force Art Program in 1978. His works appear in many military museums and in the National Air and Space Museum In Washington D.C.



Konrad was the recipient of the Dorothy Driehaus Mellin Fellowship for Midwestern Artists at the OPA 2011 National Exhibition.
