In addition, this year in the Master Signature Division, C.W. Mundy OPAM claimed the Gold Medal and \$5,000 cash for his exceptional painting, "Brass with Oranges."



Victorian Painting ... "No Longer a Dirty Word" A presentation of Art History by Peter Trippi Editor of Fine Art Connoisseur Magazine

Peter Trippi is a renowned expert on the subject of representational art history. He began his talk by stating "It is time to get rid of the notion that the Victorian era of painting was somehow stiff, stuffy and an "old fuddy duddy" period of painting without merit. His rapid fire lecture was punctuated with an illuminating slide presentation that illustrated the styles, subjects, tastes and cultural mores of the Victorian age. In fact, he said oil paintings were the media of their time and were the main source of entertainment and means of communicating cultural standards and changing ideas.

Great Briton's Queen Victoria and her husband Prince Albert ruled the world's greatest imperial power. The love and fidelity that they represented set the tone and manners of the era that was named for her. The leading force in the art world at that time was the Royal Academy of Art in London. In 1851 the first painting of Victoria and Albert was shown at the World Exhibition Opening. The council of the Royal Academy was charged with selecting the finest paintings for the 1876 Exhibition.

Some of the master artists of the time that Mr. Trippi referred to in

pictures and commentary were: Sir Joshua Reynolds, JMW Turner, William Perceval Firth, G.B. O'Neil, Samuel Butler, Frans Xavier Winterhalter, John Ruskin, Sir John Everett Millais, G.F. Watts, John William Waterhouse, Jules-Bastien Lapage, Walter Sickert, and Sir William Orpin (Google them to see images of their paintings).

Some of the themes that those artists explored were as wide ranging as dramatic, historic and cultural stories and funny and witty stories that poked fun and commented on the news and politicians of the day. Patriotic themes, pride in the ocean and marine scenes were also the favorites of this sea going nation. Also popular were paintings depicting modern life such as life at the seaside where all classes of society were shown together.

Morality was another subject for artists to explore such as adultery, unemployment, work ethic, heroics, anti aristocratic themes and women's coming into their own. Classical romantic themes such as home life, children with pets, the English countryside with farm animals and wild life were favored. The English homeland and its na-



ture depicting a return to the old life and ways were worthy motifs as well. Bygone civilizations and cultures were also explored as a means of comparing the current atmosphere in Briton with prior times. Figures wearing Roman regalia and in Roman settings interested the art loving Brits of their time.


For those of us who love classical representational painting, this program was an eye opener that added another layer of art appreciation to our repertoire.

As a way of explaining the sometimes fickle fates and what's in and what's out in the art popularity world, Peter Trippi left us with these wise words. "Quality does eventually get noticed. It will come back. The markets will win out!""

MEET THE ASSOCIATE AND SIGNATURE GOLD MEDAL WINNER DAN BECK OPA



Dan Beck is the Gold Medal winner of the 2011 Oil Painters of America National Exhibition. Other awards include six awards of excellence with Oil Painters of America (three National and three Regional). He has also won two consecutive Raymar Art Competition Awards of Excellence and an Award of Excellence with Salon International hosted by Greenhouse Gallery. *The Southwest Art* November 2008 issue had a feature article "A Painter's Playlist" and his painting "Waiting" was selected for the cover of that issue. He has also been featured in *American Artist*, as well as in *Art of the West* and *Art Talk* magazines.

Dan has been invited to nationally prominent shows such as the annual American Miniature Show at Settlers West Galleries, Tucson, Arizona, the first annual summer miniature show at Trailside Galleries in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, the annual "Fall Classic" in Hamilton, Montana and the annual Great American Figurative Artists Show at Waterhouse Gallery, Santa Barbara, California.

His paintings have found collectors in both the private and corporate world on a national level as well as from such diverse places as Canada, Japan and the Middle East. He is in the permanent collection of the Littleton Historical Museum and has exhibited with the Phippen Museum, Prescott, Arizona.


MEET THE MASTER SIGNATURE GOLD MEDAL WINNER C. W. MUNDY OPAM

C.W. Mundy, an American Impressionist Artist, was born and raised in Indianapolis, Indiana. He graduated with a Fine Art Degree from Ball State University in Indiana in 1969, and following graduation, moved to California, continuing to paint, play music and attend Long Beach State, California for a Masters Degree in Fine Art.

Upon returning home to Indiana in 1978, CW lived in Nashville, Indiana and became the first artist / illustrator to work for Bob Knight, the legendary basketball coach at Indiana University.

After a 10 year stint with sports illustration, C.W. took on the challenge in the early 1990's of painting in a more impressionistic style, going out of doors and painting "en plein air" and "from life".

This painting style led C.W. to a series of European Plein Air painting trips, beginning with the exhibition *Paysages de France* in 1995. Other European Collections include *Italy: Light & Color* in 1996, *England: The Treasured Isle* in 1997, *The Mediterranean Tour* in 1998, *Spain:Cities and Harbors* in 1999, *Vienna and Prague* in 2000, *The European Collection* in 2002, *Paysages de France: A Decade Later* in 2005 and most recently *Venice to Paris 2009: Light and Shadow*.



20 Great Oil Painting Tips by Craig Shillam

OPA recently came across member Craig Shillam's awesome blog called CashArtBlog.com. Craig attended this year's National Exhibition and wrote some very insightful articles that we thought would be of interest to our members. Thanks to Craig's generosity we are able to share some of them with you!

Having recently attended the Oil Painters of America 20th Annual Exhibition, I came away with some great <u>oil painting tips</u> I would like to share with you. Some you may already be aware of, and some might be new to you. But if there is just one good tip here that you can use, it's worth reading on...

Up until a couple of weeks ago, I had never attended any of the Oil Painters of America functions, and I didn't know what to expect. I was hoping to get some good oil painting tips, as well as some marketing ideas. I got all that and more. The complete schedule lasted almost a full week, but I was only able to attend on the weekend, so I signed up for five seminars, and took in the show at Devin Galleries in Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, Several seminars were offered, from demonstrations to marketing, some were free, and some were not.

I came away with a lot information, so much so, that I am going to write three posts on the seminars I attended. This first post will deal with oil painting tips, the second and third (soon to follow) will deal with art marketing.

Oil Painting Tips

The first seminar I attended was by artist Ned Mueller OPAM. I had never heard of Ned before, but he went to Art Center and loves to travel, so I signed up for his talk.

Here are some great oil painting tips from Ned Mueller OPAM:

1. "Plein air painting is the best thing you can do to improve your paintings." He went on to say that if you can get the big shapes in, get the colors right and the shapes right, you'll get a likeness.

2. "All good drawing is good judgment. If you make good judgment decisions, and do enough of it, you will get really, really good."

3. "Loosen up. Hold the pencil or brush way out in front of you and use your shoulder."

4. "A good painting is an interesting arrangement of shapes and colors. Most paintings are doomed from the start because the artist hasn't figured out what to say and how to say it."

5. "Once you start seeing the world more abstract, you start seeing like an artist. There can be a good painting in a pile of rags."

6. "There are three stages of being an artist: 1. You start by painting what you know. 2. Then you paint what you see. 3. When you paint what you feel, you start improving." Those are great oil painting tips, and Ned Mueller OPAM seems to be a pretty popular guy. There were people around him everywhere he went. Another thing he said was that he is in his 70's and he still goes to life drawing, and does a lot of gesture drawings. More Oil Painting Tips

In addition to Ned Mueller OPAM, I also signed up for a painting demonstration by Neil Patterson. The only thing I knew about Neil Patterson was that he is the current president of the Oil Painters of America. This guy is a pretty cool cat. First of all, it's the appearance: Long, graving beard, dressed in black with a black brimmed hat. Second, it's his voice. Come to find out, he lives up by Calgary, Alberta, and he has a bit of an accent to go with a soothing voice and a ton of knowledge. I could listen to him all day.

The following are some great oil painting tips by Neil Patterson OPAM as he was doing his painting demonstration up on a stage in front of about forty people or so.

1. "Paint with the paint, not the brush. Paint like a millionaire, use lots of paint."

Shillam con't.

2. "Don't think about values." He only thinks about colors.

3. "Have no preconceived idea... have more feeling. If you have a preconceived idea, it will never turn out that way."

4. "The connection that people have to painting is what sells. The type of painting you do depends upon your temperament."

5. "If painting is misery, you might as well go clean house."

6. "Don't let galleries pigeon hole you – you paint what you want."

7. "Painting is the road that never ends. I know less now than when I started."

8. "I don't care if my painting turns out or not, because I enjoy myself."

9. "We think paintings are more important than they really are. *The act of painting is the important thing.*" 10. "Yellow is the tip of the nose, red is the modifier, and blue is cold. People are attracted to the fire, not the cold." Keep this in mind when you are painting. Yellow advances more than any other color, not red.

11. "Windsor & Newton developed the paint brush with the black handle, so an artist can use it to check the values of the painting."

12. "Take A Chance!"

13. "If you really want to be a better painter, do this: Prepare 365 small canvases for painting. Every morning when you get up, before you do anything else, paint one painting for fifteen minutes. No more than fifteen minutes. Number them. You will learn to paint in bigger areas and paint faster." He mentioned that he had one person from one of his workshops do this, and the results were incredible.

14. "There are no rules. If there are rules, you have to stay within them. When you paint a long time, you have your own set of guide-

lines. If we all paint by the same rules, we all paint the same way."

15. The one thing I could really "feel" as I was watching and listening to Patterson was the freedom he must feel with his work. I felt free just watching him put that paint down. It was a really good feeling. At the end of the painting demo, Mr. Patterson preceded to put a frame on the demo painting, and give it away to the person with the right number taped beneath their chair. Dear Wanting,

I say move out of the studio to paint en plein air. Rocks are quite accommodating and wonderful to paint, able to hold a pose for hours.

Although you likely know the drill, some thoughts, nonetheless, on plein air painting...

Be mindful about what kind of pollen fills the air and when. Pollen Deco contributes greatly to that

> fresh, alla prima look and helps to lead the viewer through the painting. The wind will usually distribute it over the best parts. Inspiring, I tell you. Some artists have been known to further enhance their artwork with a dash of dirt here and there -using the Pollack Method of Application, of course.

> A popular song you might hum as you work: "The gnats go marching one-by-one, hurrah, hurrah! Around the colors they will roam, hurrah, hurrah!" Be careful not to conduct this Great Chorus with your brush as you attempt to reroute these delightful creatures!

> As you work, you can take out whatever distracts from the scene, but when Little Susie's mother inquires as to whether you will paint her darling on the bridge, remember

to say, "Why, [considered pause] yes!" Her mother might buy the painting, after all. (Don't be bothered by any ka-ching you hear... stay focused.)

Be prepared to summarize, in 15 minutes, everything necessary for Onlooking Wannabe to paint his masterpiece. After all, McPlein Air Drive-Through R-us. Never mind that the light is changing, changing.

The best part -- you will return again and again to respond to the awe-inspiring beauty you see, no matter the hazard or challenge.

Just come prepared, and paint the light!

MEET THE FIRST ONLINE SHOWCASE WINNER KATYA O'HAGAN

Katya (who would prefer to be called "Katie") O'Hagan was born and raised in Scotland and moved to the States in 1993. Growing up on the remote north coast, she often passed the time by sketching the customers who came into her father's pub. Although these drawings were well received, her talent for portraiture was not something she explored further or took seriously until many years later, in 2004, when she picked up her first set of oil paints. Although largely self-taught, she has benefited greatly from the ongoing mentorship of her friend, and fellow Hudson Valley artist, Paul McCormack.

Her work has shown in several galleries and group shows throughout New York and New Jersey, including the National Arts Club and the Salmagundi Club. She was a finalist in the Richeson Gallery's 2011 competition, the *Artist's Magazine* competition in 2010 and 2011, and her work was selected for the *Artist's Magazine* 2012 calendar. I want to thank the OPA for awarding a scholarship to me for 2010. The OPA scholarship gave me a wonderful opportunity to study landscape plein air painting with Robert Johnson in beautiful Estes Park, CO this fall. Robert is a generous and thoughtful teacher. His paintings, whether still life or landscape, are full of thick and vibrant paint.

The first day we met at the historic Baldpate Inn for a brief introduction to his thoughts on painting, and then we were out to paint the beautiful aspens surrounding the inn. Robert did a demo in the afternoon, showing his technique in starting a painting of aspens. Each day started or ended with a brief demo, where we

watched as his carefully placed brush strokes seemed to magically recreate the scene in front of us. Setting up in "open shade" was the first thing I quickly learned when the sun hit my painting and I could not get correct values according to the scene in front of me. He stressed the importance of getting the idea of the painting down as soon as possible and the importance of designing the painting from the start including the area of compelling interest. The rapidly changing weather conditions made that a necessity. A couple of days of rain only provided us with the privilege of watching a still life demo.

Thank you so much for this opportunity to study with Robert Johnson. A workshop not only provides lessons from the artist teaching but the opportunity to meet other wonderful artists from around the country. The concepts that I learned can be applied to all areas of my painting as well as landscapes. I realized that I need a lot of hard work to become a proficient plein air painter but it only served as encouragement to get out there and do it more often. I would encourage all to use this wonderful opportunity that OPA provides through the Shirl Smithson Scholarship.


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
