

JUROR OF AWARDS STATEMENT By Sherrie McGraw OPAM

When I agreed to take on the task of judging this national exhibition, I knew it would be difficult. Many of the participants are colleagues; some have been my students, and some were new discoveries. Luckily, as my fascination with painting runs deep, I never tire of seeing new interpretations in this medium, and in that respect, judging often feels like an indulgence of my obsession with painting.

Every judge holds certain qualities dear. For me, the most compelling aspect of good painting is the presence of a visual concept. When it is strong enough, it can trump other lacks in technical ability, and this is where subjectivity creeps in. When I found myself comparing different paintings and judging their relative success in capturing a concept with interesting paint quality as well as noticing whether or not it was drawn well, the



difficulty of judging compounded. At the end of the day, I felt that all of the winners had one or more of these qualities in their work. Had there been more awards, I would have felt even more satisfied, as there were paintings that unfortunately lost out in the artistic dance that is judging.



MEET THE ASSOCIATE AND SIGNATURE GOLD MEDAL WINNER JOHANNA HARMON OPA

Johanna Harmon was born in 1968 in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, but spent most of her childhood in Tempe, Arizona. Johanna began designing and recording visual observations at the age of seven, but it wasn't until almost two decades later that she was introduced to the traditional language of art at the Scottsdale Artists' School in Scottsdale, Arizona, the Fechin Art Institute in Taos, New Mexico, and the Art Students League of Denver in Denver, Colorado. There, she studied painting alongside prominent figure artists with varied artistic philosophies and approaches such as Carolyn Anderson, John Asaro, Scott Burdick, Mark Daily, Daniel Gerhartz OPAM, Quang Ho OPAM, and C.W. Mundy OPAM.

Her work has been exhibited with the Art Renewal Center, *The Artist's Magazine*, California Art Club Gold Medal Exhibition, Oil Painters of America, Portrait Society of America, and Scottsdale Artists' School. She has received numerous prestigious awards throughout the years. Most recently she was honored with the OPA Signature Member designation, and acceptance into the 2013 Oil Painters of America's 22nd National Juried Exhibition - her eighth National Juried Exhibition - where she received her second Gold Medal Award, becoming the first artist to receive two OPA National Exhibition Gold Medal Awards in the organization's history. Her first Gold Medal was awarded in 2007.

Over the past decade, her work has been presented in numerous solo, group and juried exhibitions, and is collected internationally. Her work has been published in *Southwest Art*, *Artbook of the New West*, and *Focus Santa Fe*.

Harmon has taught workshops at North River Arts Society in Marshfield Hills, Massachusetts, and the Coppini Academy of Art in San Antonio, Texas. Currently, she teaches at The Art Student's League of Denver. Her emphasis is on the clarification of visual intention, while nurturing the overall painted subject. This pivotal understanding defines her work today. She credits Cecilia Beaux, Nicolai Fechin, John Singer Sargent, Joaquin Sorolla and Anders Zorn as inspiration.

Johanna now resides in beautiful Highlands Ranch, Colorado, with her husband of 16 years, Steven.

MEET THE MASTER SIGNATURE GOLD MEDAL WINNER SHI ZHONG YAN OPAM

Shi Zhong Yan was born and raised in the coastal city of Qingdao, China. Influenced by his father who was an architect, Shi Zhong fell in love with art at a young age. He studied under various well-known local artists and at the age of sixteen he was accepted by Central Academy of Fine Arts Affiliated School, often referred to as the cradle of fine artists, where he studied for four years.



When the culture revolution swept China, Shi Zhong never gave up on his artistic dream. He was exiled and worked at manual labor in the countryside, but still took every minute he could to paint the world around him. When the cultural revolution ended, he was one of the first students accepted by China Academy of Fine Arts' graduate program. He continued his studies under one of the most well-known artists in China, Mr. Quan Shanshi. Shi Zhong studied in-depth the styles and techniques of Russian and European as well as American Impressionist Masters and was influenced by artists like Rechin, Degas, Cezanne, Sargent, etc.

In 1998, Shi Zhong and his family moved to the United States where he began a new chapter of his life as well as artistic career. Shi Zhong now resides in Illinois. He has four collections of artwork published and has been published by countless magazines and newspapers. Shi Zhong has had many solo and group exhibitions in China, the United States, Japan, France, Australia, Canada, Taiwan and Hong Kong. He has received many awards and his paintings are collected and loved by collectors all over the world.

MEET THE DOROTHY DRIEHAUS MELLIN FELLOWSHIP FOR MIDWESTERN ARTISTS WINNER TOM NACHREINER

Driven by a passion for excellence, Tom spent his earlier years as a nationally known figurative illustrator. More recent years have afforded him the privilege of a fine art rebirth, painting from his heart "en plein air" and conducting year round workshops. Among many other recognitions, recently Tom has won "Best of Show" at the 2006 & 2011 Cedarburg Plein Air Painting Competitions. He won "Best of Show" at Milwaukee's Plein Air Event in 2008, First Place at 2008 Door County Plein Air Festival, Second Place at the same event in 2009, and Third Place in 2011. He was juried into OPA's National Shows in 2009, 2012

and 2013 as well as OPA's Eastern Regional Show in 2010 and Salon Show in in 2013. In 2010 Tom was published in "Best Oil Painters of America". This July 2013 will be Tom's seventh year at the Door Country Plein Air Festival of 40 national and international invited artists.

"I want to say just enough with paint to evoke the imagination." Tom paints for the love of dynamic composition, the celebration of color, and the tactile feel of applying juicy, wet paint to the canvas, at the same time having fun, enjoying the sounds and feelings of being outdoors, talking to others, doing what he loves, and trying to learn as much as he can before the end of each day."

DEMOS!

Friday morning of the OPA 22nd National Convention kicked off with painting demonstrations at the Admiral Nimitz Museum by Kenn Backhaus OPAM, Scott Burdick, John Michael Carter OPAM, John Cosby and Elizabeth Robbins OPA. Attendees enjoyed watching the painters at work and learned from the tips they shared. Here are a few observations and notes I made during the painting session as I moved from station to station.

Scott Burdick painted a head study of a young girl indoors. His set-up included a large floor light with a daylight filter. He began his painting by blocking in a flesh tone on the canvas. Scott said he likes to work from big to small and from warm to cool incorporating component colors. As he put down his reference points, he said he was thinking of the relationship between key points such as the eyes, and then everything else was measured off of that. He said he tries to find a balance between the drawing and the brushwork. In painting a pretty lady or a girl, he said he is more constrained with his brushwork because it is so important to get the drawing right; but he will play up the brushwork when he paints a model with character, such as the old face of a Navajo. He engaged his model in conversation so as to fully capture her essence in the portrait.


John Michael Carter OPAM, painted his model, a young woman wearing a brightly striped scarf, by starting with a middle value blue to lay in undertones to begin organizing the shapes of the face. He focused on having cool lights and warm shadows; his set -up included a large daylight filter floor lamp with a secondary warm fluorescent accent light. Once he had his cool under painting drawn, he came in with flesh tones in a range of values. As he worked across the painting he put in shapes and pieces of color in a way that made me think of a mosaic or stained glass. As he changed colors he changed brushes. In working with periphery areas, sometimes rather than using a brush, he used a palette knife. Then he came in with a fan brush to knock down

edges just a little bit without losing his brushwork. In painting the scarf, variation in paint application ranged from a dry brush technique to create a shape of paint rather than making fabric, to a few pieces of very heavy impasto; he explained that a flat abstract shape makes a developed shape seem rounder.

Elizabeth Robbins OPA, painted a still life of white roses from a traditional shadowbox set-up. She began with a very dark wash over the entire canvas, and then used a paper towel to wipe out areas for the roses, creating varied shapes. She did this in order to emphasize mass rather than drawing. The roses were painted with one flower in more detail and contrast to serve as a focal point, and the remaining roses fading into less focus as they receded into the background. Once the subject was painted, she did not have to paint a background or shadows because the initial wash was dark enough to serve as both. In a short amount of time, she had the whole painting looking complete in her loose painting style. She said that she likes to have fun and be free spirited when she paints, and that she

doesn't like rules, except that you should paint what you love. I noted that she squints when painting, which would aid in pushing the values to achieve the nice chiaroscuro effect she accomplished.

Outdoors, John Cosby painted a boat scene from his travels in Cuando, China. He began his painting by blocking in shapes of colors. He said that in any flat surface he is trying to create a sense of color change. He is always looking for movement - red, blue, green. He will stay in a value while changing the color to create this movement. As he painted, he put green water in front of a smoggy red sky, pulling the water forward, the smooth water reflecting the warm color of the sky. He put more texture in the boat, painted green with a blue highlight, with a heavy impasto light value on the inside of the boat. He said that he is very careful with the values in his painting and how he

builds them in creating the painting. He puts big value jumps in the foreground and less in the background to create a sense of depth. Finally he added the smaller details. I was impressed that John was able to paint this beautiful piece while not being able to see his iPad image well due to glare. He said that he "had to draw on experience for this one," a good reminder that sometimes you have to paint what you know and not what you see.

In the gazebo, Kenn Backhaus OPAM, painted an architectural scene using a reference photograph from Pioga, Italy. He began with an umber wash to block in the drawing. After adding warm yellows, he dropped in his cool notes. He worked quickly, stepping back from his work frequently. I enjoyed his animated dialogue as he loaded paint onto his brush as it swirled around in the loads of paint on his palette. He said that the first thing he sees is the design, and then he draws into it with good

brushwork, the focal point having the sharpest edge and contrast. He pointed out the six sources of light: sunlight, ambient (sky), reflective, overcast, moonlight, and artificial. He set up the colors based on what was in light and what was in shadow, getting the color temperature shifts right, and then got more definitive as the painting progressed. He used a palette knife to put in impasto demarcation, giving the painting dimension. He pointed out that it is important to understand the planes and how they change depending on how they face the light; he said that this is where you will find those temperature shifts

It was interesting to see so many different approaches to making a painting, and how each end result turned out beautifully. A special thanks goes to these wonderful artists for sharing their expertise with us. I know we all learned from watching them work.



MEET ON-LINE SHOWCASE WINNER DEREK PENIX

Derek Penix was born on December 29, 1980 in Tulsa, Oklahoma. Growing up Penix was surrounded by artists in his family as his mother and grandfather were painters. Penix did not pursue painting until after graduating from high school. Penix's mother encouraged him to pursue his talent and took his paintings to a local gallery where he sold his first piece.

Through the years Penix has been inspired by old masters such as Nicolai Fechin, Sargent and the French Impressionists. As an artist Penix gains inspiration from his environment, whether that be at the park, in his home, or traveling abroad. He enjoys the freedom to paint different subject matter and has learned to push himself to try new things, even if they are out of his comfort zone.
